



Table 1. Specific Telepractice Considerations by BBCS-R/BSRA

BBCS-R/BSRA	Considerations
Receptive Vocabulary	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Requires high-quality audio for examinee and examiner• Examiner shows the visual stimuli and provides a verbal prompt• Examinee views the image onscreen and may respond in one of two ways: 1) by pointing to the picture choice on the screen, or 2) by receiving mouse control from the examiner to move the mouse over the picture chosen (this also is dependent on the capabilities of the telepractice platform chosen)• Verbal stimulus should correspond to the manner in how the examiner anticipates the examinee will respond. For example, "show me XXX" versus "tell me the number of the picture that shows XXX" versus "point to XXX" vs "touch XXX" (see Peripheral Camera or Device section)• In particular, 3 year olds may not be able to respond in the three ways described above because the child cannot accurately name numbers, has poor motor control for pointing, or cannot maneuver a mouse. An acceptable accommodation would be to "touch" the picture choice (see Peripheral Camera section)
